"Exhausting Democracy: Wilderson in South Africa"

This talk reconstructs the significance of Frank B. Wilderson III's surprisingly rarely-considered experience of having been a militant in the South African anti-apartheid struggle for the development, reception and contemporary disavowal of Afropessimist thought. Wilderson was a member of *uMkhonto* we Sizwe, the paramilitary wing of a coalition between the African National Congress and the South African Communist Party before refusing, for a time, to demobilize when ordered to by Nelson Mandela's administration. How might we square the dominant reading of Wilderson, as a figure marked by his systematic refusal of hope, with its uncanny double, a figure who refused to give up, who is marked by an attachment so excessive that he sustains it beyond the terrain where it might have been lived as a collective, historical commitment? What might we learn about, or become unsettled by, in the texture of political endurance if we retain Wilderson's connection to this unmourned ideal, across the dissolution of its proper collective subject, as he lives and writes it as ontological exhaustion? As theoretical production?
